
Youth who respond and serve faithfully in the Y achieve a rewarding and fulfilling life. They are also able to successfully reach out to their fellow youth and help them do likewise!

### The Poor in the Land

#### Deuteronomy 15:1-18

Poverty is a serious problem not only during the ancient days but more so a pressing issue today in a world rich with resources. This article is a sermon preached by highly respected pastor, Rev. Hwa Jen on social concerns Sunday, 9th July 2017 at Penang Wesley Methodist Church. The scriptural text from Deuteronomy teaches how the poor are liberated from debt which could otherwise trap them in a vicious cycle of poverty. There is much we can learn from this message which is very relevant to YMCA since our mission is to show the love of Christ by helping the poor and needy.

At the start of his sermon Rev. Hwa Jen presents a case story, highlighting how some of the poor in Malaysia are kept perpetually poor by the unscrupulous and greedy. This was his personal experience as a pastor serving in Segamat Johor, 20 years ago where he learnt of the plight of many poor Indian families who had been bonded to the estate for generations and could not escape the vicious cycle that kept them in poverty.



### A Case Story in Malaysia – The story of Indentured/Bonded Labour

Many poor families in Malaysia are exploited by unscrupulous people who keep them perpetually poor by a corrupt system of indentured/bonded labour. In principle it seems an ideal instrument where the poor receive financial assistance to learn a trade or venture abroad for better opportunities.

The problem begins when a poor man wants to learn a trade or venture overseas to find work but has no means to do so. He borrows money and indentures himself to work for a master or landowner for a number of years. At the end of the period he is set free to venture on his own. In practice it is not that straight forward as the poor labourers are subject to all kinds of harsh and dangerous conditions, violence, coercion and abuses.

This was the mode for many poor migrant workers from India and China who came to Malaysia in the early 19th and 20th Century to work in the tin mines and rubber estates.

Bonded labour is a form of slavery where many Indian labourers working in the Rubber and Palm Oil Estates are victims of. It starts off innocently when the poor labourer needs money to get married or to meet some unexpected family expenses. He goes to his boss, estate manager or mandor and gets a salary advance or a loan. After deducting the loan and interest, the worker is left with very little to meet his daily expenses. So he resorts to further borrowing. This continues with no prospects of the worker being able to pay off his debts. Thus he becomes a slave to his employer and is forced to work long hours and under unreasonable conditions. Even in the event of death, the debt is assigned to surviving family members. And this can carry on for generations. The whole family has virtually become a slave to the master.

A system that was meant to help the poor and needy was distorted and corrupted to entrap and enslave them. This kind of practice is not new, it is ancient. Evil selfish men and women have always been able to find ways and means to exploit and trap poor people, control them and keep them in their power.

Now I hope, you begin to realise why the commandment in Deuteronomy 15 was given by God to the Israelites. And we need to ask ourselves what we can learn from the passage and apply this teaching to our life, and our world today.

We are all aware that the expression Social Concerns can be very broad and covers many issues. On this Social Concerns Sunday, I will therefore just focus on this one issue: our concern for the poor. There are many references in the Bible that remind us that our God cares very much for the poor, and I have decided to take this passage from Deuteronomy today.

### 1. The Teaching from Deuteronomy 15:1-18

### a. <u>Year of Cancelling Debts</u>

The command is given that all debts should be cancelled once every seven years - in the Sabbath year, the year of rest. (The root meaning of the word Sabbath is rest.) The fields are not plowed, and there would be no regular harvest. There would be no possibility for any borrower to find enough income to pay their loans. Hence, the Lord's command: the debt should be cancelled, so that no outstanding debt owed by any person or family would be carried on indefinitely from year to year, from one generation to the next. That would be a real sabbath also for all those who were poor and needy. In fact, some of the people might have been so poor that they had to sell themselves off as slaves. Then in the Sabbath year, they would become free again.

(There is also the Jubilee year, when all the land that had been sold or mortgaged would be returned to their original owners at the end of 50 years. Leviticus 25:8-17.)

There are several points we need to note:

#### b) The Promise (vv.4-6)

In v.4 we read: "However, there should be no poor among you, for in the land the LORD your God is giving you to possess as your inheritance, he will richly bless you, . . ." Under the Lord's generous provision and blessing, God told the Israelites there should be no poor people among them, but only if one primary condition is met: ". . . if only you fully obey the LORD your God and are careful to follow all these commands I am giving you today." (v.5) In fact this passage itself has several references to the blessings and rewards of obedience (see vv.10,14,18).

This promise was never fulfilled in the OT, because the Israelites never could have fully obeyed and followed all of God's commandments. Thus the OT Scripture is full of longing and future hope for the world to be made right according to God's plan.

Interestingly, it was fulfilled once, and only once, in the NT. In Acts 4:32-35 we read:

<sup>432</sup> All the believers were one in heart and mind. No one claimed that any of their possessions was their own, but they shared everything they had. 33 With great power the apostles continued to testify to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus. And God's grace was so powerfully at work in them all <sup>34</sup> that there were no needy persons among them. For from time to time those who owned land or houses sold them, brought the money from the sales <sup>35</sup> and put it at the apostles' feet, and it was distributed to anyone who had need."

But sadly, this experiment did not last. By Acts 5, the whole idea began to fall apart with the sin of Ananias and Sapphira. Nowhere else in the Bible was such a model of communal life ever referred to again. In practical terms, it was just too hard to sustain, as the Church was and still is a long way from being perfect in obedience and becoming truly one in Christ.

Over the past 2000 years, Christians in many places had tried time and again to develop such a "perfect" model of church and community sharing. Many lasted just for a short while, and such communities are few and far in between. But we do have this as an ideal given in the Bible, and the Church must still strive toward this model of sharing and oneness in Christ,--but only on God's terms and according to Biblical principles. All other attempts based on human ideas (e.g. Communism) have inevitably failed.

### c) <u>The How and the Why (vv.12-18)</u>

The details for how regarding this cancelling of debts are found in Deut. 15 (vv. 7-10, 12-14, 18), and also in a number of other passages in the Books of Moses. But do note the words used for how it is to be done: open-handed (vv.8, 11), freely lend (v.8), give generously without grudging (v.10), and not be hard-hearted or tight-fisted (v.7). We all know how difficult it is to actually put this into practice.

This cancelling of debts was based really on a more fundamental principle--the care and concern for their neighbour, their fellow-country man, who was a brother. When the poor had a need, the Israelites were to help and lend to them, without interest, without hesitation.

This scripture passage also points out why they should do so. (vv. 11,15,16,17)

### i) <u>The poor will always be there ... (vv.7,11)</u>

All human societies cannot get away from this one simple truism: the poor will always be there. (vv.7,11) Why? We are not in heaven--not yet, and the world we live in is still waiting to be made new. There will still be inequality and inequity, floods and droughts, illnesses and other problems. In spite of everyone's best efforts, there will always be those who do not do so well; those who are not as successful and capable as others, those who are weaker or less capable; and those who do not have enough. There will always be someone around us in need of help.

We all note that Jesus had made reference to Deut. 15:11 in Matthew 26:11 "The poor you will always have with you, but you will not always have me." It should be taken as a reminder that not only are there times when we can be extravagant in our worship to God, but also that we must be constantly aware of the poor around us needing help. to do? They were therefore to reach out in love, in concern, in compassion, to help whenever they could. The purpose of cancelling debts of the poor and even lend to the needy was to help those who were poor, those who did not have enough, and even those who had nothing.

### ii) We are Brothers (see vv. 2,3,7)

We are not to forget that we are all part of God's community and God's family; we are brothers and sisters. So we are to help one another without counting the cost. The welfare of our brother/ neighbour/countryman is our concern. We must recognise that 'we are our brother's keepers.' Cain rejected this responsibility once (Genesis 4:9), and we have all tried to avoid this ever since.

We can see that even the instruction in vv.16,17 is given so that their brother/sister might have a better and happier life under their care in their master's household, even though "in theory" they remained slave(s). We all know from experience that there are always those who are not able to manage their own affairs as they should, or do not have the opportunity, the resources, or the wisdom to do. And it would in fact be better for they to come under your care and protection, and be dependent on you. (As an example, a case may be made that many of the foreign workers and some of maids that have come to work here in Malaysia know that they do have a "better" life here than if they were to return to their home countries. This is especially true if you as their employers care for them and appreciate the contributions these workers have made to your own lives and families. In a very real sense, if they return home, it would not just be your loss, but also theirs.)

In other words, the Bible constantly reminds us that we are all equal in God's sight as His children. Our concern should always be for the welfare and the well-being of our sister, our brother, and our neighbour, and to care for one another in the best way we can.

So what were God's people in God's community,



### iii) God Cares

This, obviously, is the most important reason of all. Throughout both OT and NT, God is revealed as a God who cares for His people and for the world, and especially for the poor,--those who have nothing and with no one to help them, the weak and the powerless. God the Almighty will always be the God of the helpless. So He reminded them in v.15 "God has redeemed you from slavery". In other words, He cared for you and set you free, and you must do what you can in your power to set others free, and not to enslave them.

As NT people, we are to remember that we have been redeemed from the greater slavery to sin and death through God's own Son, Jesus Christ. He has given us life and hope, joy and peace. He cares and redeems us because you and I were helpless and without hope.

Helping the poor and needy then is only a small token of our thanksgiving and gratitude and our proper response to a generous, gracious, loving and compassionate God. We must so live as to be like our Lord Jesus Christ and our God and Heavenly Father.

D.T. Niles, (1908-1970), a theologian from Sri Lanka once said: "Christianity is one beggar telling another beggar where he found bread." Such a statement makes sense only if we recognise there are still many beggars around us still looking for bread to survive this life on earth, even as we long to share with them the Gospel of Jesus Christ and the hope of life eternal.

On this Social Concerns Sunday, whether you consider yourself rich or not, we are all doing better than many others around us. We have the food and the resources that many do not, and we can all help in ways big or small. But more importantly, we must become better aware of what the Lord is saying to us in His Word day by day, and learn to live in obedience if we are to fully know His joy and blessings. I hope and pray that what we have learned through this passage of scripture today will help all of us,--as individuals, as families, as a church, to become more aware of the needs of the people around us and then learn to do what God has given us to do here in Penang and elsewhere.

### 2. Our Christian and Methodist Heritage

As an overview to what we can learn from Deuteronomy 15 and even more from the counsel of the whole Bible, I would like to close with the following:

- a) There are many exhortations in the Bible to care for the poor and needy, the widows and the fatherless, and also the aliens in the land. We need always to re-examine our own presuppositions, attitudes and prejudices in relating to others in the communities around us.
- b) The history of the Christian Church in the past 2000 years has a wonderful record of doing what is the right for the poor and needy, especially in times of need. Try to read up more of church history to broaden your understanding. We are all aware that the Church is far from perfect and have done or condoned horrible things in the past. But on the whole, when men and women, when institutions and nations sought to live in the light of God's Word and His truth, the Church has shone brightly often in a world of darkness and despair, and brought light and life to many, many millions throughout history and the world.
- c) John Wesley and the early Methodist societies have left a legacy that we must never forget. Even while studying in the university, Wesley and his friends would visit prisoners (many of whom were in jail because of debt, not for criminal offenses) and poor families, and supply food and clothing, give free schooling for the children, and medical care for



the sick. These works of charity remained a feature of the Methodist Societies, and have become a mark of the Methodist movement everywhere. The Methodist Church in Malaysia has inherited not just the Gospel and churches, but also schools, hospitals, clinics and homes for the needy in many places in both East and West Malaysia. The work of saving souls, building lives and changing society for the better continues today.

d) Our own local church, Penang Wesley Methodist Church, has also tried to do what is right in the light of the Jesus' teaching and His love, even though imperfectly.

The Christian Care Fund, or the Poor & Needy Fund, is an offering taken on Holy Communion Sundays. As we give thanks for Jesus' death and resurrection and for His salvation to us in our need, we give in thanksgiving a special offering for the poor and needy. These funds are used only for those in need, both inside and outside the church, for whatever reasons,--this may be a one-time help or even on a regular basis.

We began work in the Macallum area about six years ago, renting a shop-lot that still serves as a drop-in community centre for the seniors and lonely people, a tuition centre for many children, and a health clinic for free check-ups,--all with no strings and conditions attached. This Wesley Macallum Community Centre is now well-known and wellrecognised. Many lives have been changed, many children have become better educated and better behaved, as they attend our Sunday School and/or join the Boys' and Girls' Brigades. Numerous adults have started coming to our Hokkien service, and some have even been baptised. But there is always more that we can do, and there is also a need for more helpers and volunteers.

#### In Conclusion

Our Methodist Church in Malaysia has a document called the Social Principles that covers a whole range of issues under the rubric of social concerns in our multi-racial and multi-ethnic Malaysia. It also includes a statement called Our Social Creed, which is not an affirmation of faith, but a statement of what we stand for as a Church with regard to social issues concerning our individual lives, marriage and the home, our society, our country, and the world.


All Methodists are exhorted to read, to study and to apply these Social Principles. It would do well if all of us make an effort to do this. May the Lord bless all of us.



### YMCA Malaysia's Youth Rep report on Change Agent Regional Training 2017

I attended the Change Agent Regional Training on 12-17 July 2017. It was held at the YMCA International Youth Center Tozanso, Gotemba, Japan. This year there were a total of 12 countries which included Singapore, Sri Lanka, Japan, Myanmar, Mongolia, Malaysia, Taiwan, Hong Kong, Australia, New Zealand, Cambodia, and India.

Upon arrival at the airport, we all were picked up by Mr. Kazama and his staff. We took a shuttle for about 3 hours to reach the Tozanzo Youth Centre. After settling down, we were given a brief introduction from Mr. Mitsunaya A.K.A Pumpkin (he prefers people to call him that) and then rested.

The next day, we started with morning devotion conducted by Ivy from YMCA Hong Kong Salisbury, who read out the scripture according to John 17:20-23 followed by an inspiration message by Mr. Nam about the purpose and meaning of your life and how to be a change agent. He used Mohamad Gandhi famous quote for the reference "You must be the change you wish to see in the world." This was followed by the Grand Opening ceremony.

After that we were given a warm welcome by the MC; Karren (Philippine) and Kelvin (Japan). They greeted us "good morning" in our very own languages. This was followed by Kelvin who taught us to fold paper cranes and shared with us the story behind this activity.

We then hopped into the shutter to the Korean community Centre for our exposure trip. It took us a 3 hours journey from Tozanzo to Kawasaki (where the centre was located).

Upon arrival, we received a warm welcome from Ms. Hye Jeong Kim. She explained about their community services and the history of the centre which was started in 1974. At that time, Japan imported a lot of Koreans to work as their laborers - especially at Kawasaki city. So, Kawasaki became known as an area for poor people. She also explained the seriousness of the discrimination received from the Japanese community just because they are Japanese-Korean. They had a hard time in finding jobs due to their Korean identity. Some youths even quit schooling because they felt it was pointless to study hard for a job that they couldn't get. The Korean community even took on Japanese names for the sake of blending into the Japanese community.

Mr. Ho Jeong Heong continuedly to explained how they overcame this situation. They started a program called "let everyone live up his/her potential" which was a program that gathered the Korean community in Japan to stay together and to look out for one another. They also started a pre-school and shared the good values of Korean culture to make their kids proud to be Korean-Japanese.

The next day, Mr. Nam Boo Won spoke on the topic of "Christian & Ecumenical identity & legacy." He shared some of the YMCA histories. Interestingly, there were a few groups that worked based on YMCA principles even before YMCA was formed. He also shared that the YMCA kept on stressing on God and Jesus but found a lot of people could not accept it. However, nowadays, the YMCA has been packaged it into a more acceptable

> form. Instead of stressing about God & Jesus, they concentrated more on spreading Christian values. This makes us the pioneer in the ecumenical movement. At the end of the talk, Mr. Nam kept stressing that we must all unite so that we can achieve more. (Jn.17:21) "That they all may be one."

After this, we had our own free time until the barbeque dinner. A few of us decided to hike up to the top of YMCA Tozanso to further fellowship and also to have a magnificent view of Mount Fuji

The following day, Dr. Lee stressed that the goal of youth empowerment is to create opportunities for youth participation and leadership development. This leads to active contribution to sustainable community development projects. The objective is to enhance the knowledge and experiential learning about social issues that are affecting youths and the communities. Youth empowerment is all about providing the necessary resources and stewardship to accomplish the mission of the YMCA. After that, we were divided into groups and discussed the root cause of the interruption of youth empowerment on the national level. In summary, the main problem that the youths are facing is the lack of financial support as funds has not been allocated. The second reason was the generation gap where the adults are not willing to hear the voices of the youths.

The next program is hiking up Mount Fuji. It took us about 3 hours to hike up to our designated area. This program taught us to be supportive of one another and to possess the spirit of never giving up!

We started our last day with morning devotion. The devotion on that day was special as all of us were told just to sit down and had time for our reflections.

After that, we were given 30 minutes to think about our current YMCA programs and the strengths of our local YMCAs. In conclusion, the representatives from YMCA Australia and New Zealand said that they were focused on gym and sports programs where as Singapore, Japan, Taiwan & Hong Kong focused more on GATN (outreach to the community) programs. Myanmar, Mongolia, & Cambodia focused more on GATN (as recipient countries). India's focus is more towards youth empowerment programs.

We ended our program with a fellowship party where every country has its own performance. As for me, I was alone there, so I decided to sing our very own local Malaysian lullaby for everyone.

Overall, what impacted me most was the way how Japan YMCA organized and worked on the Change Agents regional training. They were very systematic and that was why they could be so accurate in the timing and arrangements of each program. Besides that, the exposure visit to the Korean community center was an eye-opener to me. I didn't know that there is still so much discrimination in a developed country. However, the way they handle and overcome the discriminations really impressed me! They solved the issue by uniting and solving their problem one by one. They are also aware that the future is held by the youths of today so therefore they mould them into having good values and morals from a young age. I felt that we too also implement this at our YMCA with a mentorship program.

I am excited about the new global friendships that I earned during this trip, and I cannot wait to start working in collaboration with them! I feel that my global connections can help YMCA Malaysia in terms of developing our camping programs especially if we are to collaborate with YMCA Australia. Their youths are quite experienced in camping and outdoor programs, and we can learn a lot from them. YMCAs in Malaysia which are running campsites like YMCA Sibu and YMCA Penang will benefit from this.

Overall, I would like to sincerely thank YMCA Malaysia for their support and encouragement through my process of becoming a Change Agent. Without their support, I would have never come to know the YMCA from a deeper level. My love and commitment for the YMCA have certainly grown though this process. I would also like to thank Ms. Ong Sooi Gaik for mentoring me throughout the process. She had supported me in many ways, even when I was not aware of it. I hope to know and to grow further through the empowerment of the YMCA and contribute more towards building a better YMCA for Malaysian youths in the future.

# Change Agent Global Gathering, Portugal (1st September – 10th September 2017)

More than 150 young leaders, proudly representing 49 different countries from Europe, Africa, Middle East, Australia and Asia. Wow! So many personalities and values but we all share the same universal love and a common goal – the YMCA and the empowering of young people, we are ONE MOVEMENT.

Upon my arrival, I was warmly welcomed by the local YMCA Change Agents.

I arrived at the camp site in YMCA Setubal (43 acres of land – that's huge!) and It was good to see familiar faces from previous Change Agent training in Japan, but more importantly, the excitement of meeting and making new friends and networking was even more enriching. Right after we put down our luggage at our designated camp, we walked around the campsite. It was spectacular!

The formal opening ceremonies and greetings were conducted by the General Secretary of World YMCA (Mr. Johan) the President of Setubal, YMCA (Mr. Luis Sebastiao).

There were a total of 28 workshops throughout the whole training but I attended 8 of the workshops which I felt was relevant to our Asian and local YMCA context. They are Mental Health, The Bridge project, Easter Island, Brand and Shared Messaging, Property Development Project, Empowering Democratic Participation, Global Citizenship and "I am Whole" campaign.

What stood out for me is, despite the vast differences in our cultures and traditions throughout the world, people can accept the differences. People from all walks of life were able to break barriers of communication and forge good understanding and respect for one another thus creating unity among them.

During the training, we were given a chance to visit the Portuguese Parliament, to meet with MPs of the Portuguese Government and to have a dialog session with them. During this session, we focused on the topic of 'Youth Empowerment.' The Ministers explained to us on how supportive they are towards Youth Empowerment and the programs that they have done previously. Besides that, the topic on Health and Employment was also the focus of the day, which took us into some of the social injustices that face young people today.

Environmental Immersions and Social Action was the next theme. We were split into different groups in the area of Setubal. As a total, we have 9 days of volunteering and took part in cleaning up areas at the national park, renovation of Santa Margarita Chapel, restoration of the "Patience Fountain", recuperation of a hiking pathway where I was stationed.

After our volunteering jaunt, we spent our free-time on the golden beaches of Setubal. The heat from the sun was truly hot! but if you were crazy enough you could quickly cool down in the water which was at an estimated around -50 degrees.


The last day," The cultural night" is by far the highlight for me. I have been at many international gatherings and they have never failed to amaze me. This cultural night was the best yet in my opinion. We represented 49 countries, 49 different cultures on food, costumes, drinks and 49 different form of arts music and dance. The different foods burst the palette of your tongue into joy, the drinks we sampled – some of which you needed to be courageous even to smell never mind to taste.

The night started with a fashion show that featured different countries' traditional costumes; most countries paraded down the red carpet, Cambodia, Japan, Cameroon, Malaysia and Ghana just to name a few. We were also graced with the presence of Hotu who hails from Easter Island – he showed us the traditional war dance of the Rapa Nui people. It was so captivating to learn the history of his country. Near the latter part of the night, we all engaged in something which turned out to be a tradition from Team England. They had everyone in a circle and brought the Hokey Cokey to the people.

My journey and experiences for the past 11 days have been incredible. The training had impacted me so much that I feel it is very relevant to apply it to our local YMCA especially in the area of mental health. There has been an alarming increase in youth suicides in Malaysia. I believe what the World Council has shared will be helpful to our country. They are still tackling this difficult and challenging issue and proposed solutions which could result in the decrease of the suicidal cases in the youth sector. If the advanced countries felt it is essential to address the issue and to curb the problem, we too should also practice and create an awareness towards troubled youths so that they will have a safe place to voice out their troubles, and to let them know that we do care for them. As the saying goes, prevention is better than cure.

It has been a great pleas ure to be surrounded by same minded people in Portugal. Special thanks to YMCA Malaysia for sending me on this Change Agent and exposure program. It has widened my views and deepen my roots for the YMCA. Being with so many young people makes me feel hopeful that we can make an impact in the world if we can all work together as one. I also thank YMCA Alambre Camp for their hospitality, the smiles, the music, the coffees and their service. Also, I want to appreciate the staff and the volunteers of World YMCA for their tremendous effort, their willingness to share and the behind scenes preparation for this truly educational training camp.

### YMCA Penang MONTHLY CHRISTIAN FELLOWSHIP SERVICES

Our monthly Christian Fellowship Services are held on the last Thursday of the month, at 8.00 pm in the Chapel.

We are grateful and thankful to ours speakers, the Pastors and leaders who shared the Word of God at our monthly Christian Fellowship Services.

On 29th June 2017, Sister Carmelita Xavier who worships at the Church of Divine Mercy, Penang shared the message: "Me? The Salt and the Light of the World" during our June 2017 Christian Fellowship Service.

### "What does it mean that believers are to be salt and light of the earth?" (Matthew 5:13-16)

Jesus used the concepts of salt and light a number of different times to refer to the role of His followers in the world. In Matthew 5:13 "You are the salt of the earth. But if the salt loses its saltiness, how can it be made salty again? It is no longer good for anything, except to be thrown out and trampled by men." Salt had two purposes in the Middle East of the first century. Because of the lack of refrigeration, salt was used to preserve food, especially meat which would quickly spoil in the desert environment. Believers in Christ are preservatives to the world, preserving it from the evil inherent in the society.

Secondly, salt was used then, as now, as a flavour enhancer. In the same way that salt enhances the flavour of the food it seasons, the followers of Christ stand out as those who "enhance" the flavour of life in this world. Christians, living under the guidance of the Holy Spirit and in obedience to Christ, will inevitably influence the world for good, as salt has a positive influence on the flavour of the food it seasons. Where there is strife, we are to be peacemakers; where there is sorrow, we are to be the ministers of Christ, binding up wounds, and where there is hatred, we are to exemplify the love of God in Christ, returning good for evil.

In addition to being salt for the earth, Jesus called his

followers to be the light of the world. In the memorable sermon on the Galilean hillside, Jesus transfers his light to those who follow him: "You are the light of the world." Jesus is the light of the world. Jesus calls us to be that same light.

At our 27th July 2017 Christian Fellowship Service, Pastor Steven Chin from Rifle Range Community Church shared the message "Do You Want to Get Well" from the Scripture passage John Chapter 5, verses 1 to 17

Pastor Wallace Tan, pastoring at the Apostolic Community Church, Penang shared on the topic "The Power of Love" from the Scripture text: 1 Corinthians 13 on the evening of 26th October 2017 Christian Fellowship Service.

This thirteenth chapter of the Book of 1 Corinthians is about LOVE. LOVE holds such importance.


### WORLD YMCA-YWCA WEEK OF PRAYER

### Health Talk

On 19th September 2017, Dr. Tai Lee Siang, attached to Adventist Medical Centre, as a General Surgeon gave a very interesting Health Talk, on the topic "New Approach to Detect Early Of Breast Cancer."

This was held in the Faith Room of YMCA Penang. Breast Cancer a disease, if not treated early can prove to be fatal for many people. This disease ranks top most common killer disease here in Malaysia. He said in Malaysia Breast Cancer has been discovered to be 1 in 19 women and that accounts for around 30% of all new Cancers. Approximately 5,000 Malaysian women are diagnosed with Breast Cancer every year, most of them aged between 30 to 60 years, where nearly half of those affected are under 50 years of age. Malaysian patients have poor survival rate due to lack of awareness of the signs and symptoms, fear of screening and delay in medical treatment when the traditional alternative is preferred.

He said, lifestyle risk factors could be due to smoking, alcohol consumption, overweight (BMI more than 25), lack of exercise and early menarche or 1st pregnancy at a late age in life.

The audience numbering about 55 people all in were mesmerized by his talk at the end of which, light refreshments were served to all.

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## **Emergency Response Training by APM**

Have you ever thought about what to do when an emergency occurs and who we can refer to?

We are grateful to have the opportunity to participate in Emergency Response Training which was organized and sponsored by JKKK of Fettes Park and trained by APM - Jabatan Pertahanan Awam Malaysia. The training was conducted every Saturday starting from 22 July 2017 until 12 August 2017 (total of 4 days) from 9am to 5pm at the JKKK office. APM sent their best trainers - Captain Mot, Sergeant Ng, Corporal Muhamad Arif and with assistance of Pbt Yeap to teach us.

The Emergency Response Training is not just a sharing of emergency responses but with practical simulation for each topic. On the 1st day of training, APM trainers briefed us about Civil Defense and its role in emergency responses. The training started with an explanation of First Aid Principles followed by a guidelines on the necessary steps to take during an emergency, the different types of emergency such as natural disaster, human treatment and the identification of wounds (such as cuts, bleeding and fractures) and the treatment for wounds.

We continued to learn how to treat different wound on the 2nd day. We also learned the correct way to perform CPR and operate the AED (Automated external defibrillator).

On the 3rd day of training, we learned about fire protection and the response a person should take when trapped in a fire. The last training included the procedures on how to take care of wounded victims. The training was wrapped up with a recruitment drive from APM and a thank you speech by the organizer – YB Cheah and the representatives from APM.

Though out these 4 days of training, we have a good understanding on what we should do and how we can help others during an emergency. It was a useful and meaningful training.

### An extract from "Revisiting the Reformation" from APAY

As a young person going through the book "Revising the Reformation" which was published by the Asia and Pacific Alliance of YMCAs, I was enlightened by the many topics which were covered by the brightest brains from the YMCA.

Of all the various topics, one particular one stood out for me. I wish to extract parts of it as I find it meaningful and true to a deeper understanding about the roots of YMCA's formation and its mission. It was a piece written by David Kwang-sun SUH, Ph.D. Professor Emeritus of Theology EwhaWomans University Korea, Former President of World Alliance of YMCAs (1994-1998). The sub-chapter was entitled:

## A Contemporary Mission of APAY in the Spirit of the Reformation

#### YMCA Mission in the Spirit of the Reformation

"The history of the YMCA begins with the story of George Williams, the legendary founder of the London YMCA in 1844. Williams was a businessman, a clerk in a drapery factory". As was in Martin Luther's era, the time of George Williams was also a revolutionary period.

George Williams ran his drapery factory in the middle of the Industrial Revolution, which dated from about 1760 through 1870. The Industrial Revolution began with the discovery of the steam engine, which revolutionized the means of transportation. It changed the method of production from human labor to machines for manufacturing through mass production.

Sociologically, the new factories were built in the cities, which led to urbanization around the industrial centers so that the rural agricultural communities rapidly became desolate. The newly rising industrialists and business people were forming a new middle class while the old regime of nobility and gentry was fading away. It was also the Age of Queen Victoria when human creativity in the arts and letters were bursting forth.

From the time of the Protestant Reformation to the Age of Reason and the Enlightenment, Europeans

advocated almost in unison for religious freedom, individual liberty, tolerance, fraternity, and progress. But these modern and democratic values were only for the Europeans. Betraying their own belief systems and against their values, they invaded the "other world" and destroyed the people and the land as well as non-Western civilizations with their weapons and gunboats; for while humanity was making so much progress in so many realms of life in Europe, it was also a time of brutal, savage, and bloody destructive invasions by Western armies into the rest of the world—Asia, Africa, and Latin America. For example, Great Britain officially colonized India in 1817; and in China, the First Opium War broke out in 1839 and lasted for more than three years.

The most historical irony of all is that Christian missionaries came to Asia along with the colonizers, practically on their gunboats, to spread the Gospel of Jesus, of love and peace. The YMCA of Australia, the first in the Pacific, was founded in 1851 with YMCAs being founded shortly thereafter in the Indian city of Calcutta in 1854, in New Zealand in1855, in Pakistan in 1876, in Japan in 1880, in Sri Lanka in 1882, in the Chinese city of Fuzhou in 1885, in Burma in 1897, and in the Philippines in 1898.

#### The YMCA Movement as the Second Reformation

In this Zeitgeist, the spirit of the time, a London businessman, George Williams, began a Bible study class with some 12 young factory workers.

First of all, the first YMCA movement begun by George Williams was a Christian response to the challenging times of the Industrial Revolution as Luther's religious reform action was initiated to meet the crises of the Roman Church and to respond to the changing epoch of the Renaissance.

In short, the YMCA movement was a reaction to the world of the Industrial Revolution and the Age of Reason and the Enlightenment.

The second important characteristic of the YMCA movement is that it was predominantly a movement



of laypeople and volunteers. Martin Luther and other reformers were mainly highly educated theologians, priests, and scholars, but George Williams and other YMCA leaders who came to draft the Paris Basis in 1855 were lay Christians. Martin Luther's slogan of the "priesthood of all believers" became a reality in the YMCA movement, for the YMCA was from the beginning a movement: it was outside the structure of the Church as well as its control.

Thirdly, George Williams began his work with young workers by starting a Bible study group. The YMCA movement is thus firmly rooted in the Protestant principle of sola scriptura. The YMCA movement was based on the Word of God: its Christian identity is based on the Bible and according to the Bible.

Fourthly, the YMCA movement is Christ-centered as indicated in the Paris Basis, but it is a movement that seeks to put faith into action, that is, to follow the path of Jesus as his disciples. The most important part, is the YMCA's extension of Christian faith in action. The first Protestant reformers tried to reform the Church; the YMCA movement came out from the church compound and worked in the world—a world of tumultuous social and political transition in revolutionary times. To put it simply and forcefully, the YMCA movement was not of the Church, but of the world, and for the transformation of cultural, social, and political realities. The YMCA movement is not for individual souls, but for human communities.

Fifthly, the YMCA movement strives to establish and extend the Kingdom of God, not in the other world, but "amongst young men," that is, the mission and purpose of the YMCA is to realize God's Kingdom on earth and among the young people in the world. The YMCA is a political movement for the Kingdom of God to protest against injustice, oppression, and exploitation and to promote a just, fair, and free human community of peace and harmony.

Sixthly, it is important to highlight the ecumenical nature of the YMCA movement. The Reformation was a Protestant Reformation to become separate from the Roman Catholic Church. From the beginning of the YMCA movement, however, there was no question about the denominational affiliation of the founders, whether they were Lutherans, Presbyterians, Anglicans, Methodists, members of the Reformed tradition, Quakers, Baptists, etc. Moreover, since the 1905 World Alliance Assembly, Catholics and Orthodox Christians have become full YMCA members. Furthermore, in South and Southeast Asia, Buddhists, Muslims, and Hindu Dalits have been admitted to the membership of YMCAs. The YMCA movement is color blind, and there is no discrimination according to race, sex, class, and religion.

Finally, the lifestyle of the YMCA, as an organization and as individual members, is what John Calvin's work ethic has promoted, that is, honest and hard-working people with a well-disciplined and healthy body, mind, and spirit. If there is an educational goal of the YMCA, it is the education of the whole person."


